5. ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

5.1 Investment Portfolio – Ethical Investment Discussion

Tas Ethical – S Barry

- A space to discuss the specifics of our investment portfolio and if these align with the State Council views for report to board of management.
- Tas Ethical is a financial advisory business based in Hobart –
 purely ethical investment for 16 years. As a financial advisor it is S
 Barry's philosophy that investment should not damage the
 environment, and that ethical investment is actually a smarter
 choice in terms of investing.
- Ethical investment has grown in the last 3-4 years, but before this they were quite isolated as a practice.
- To start building a portfolio, including TUSA's, Tas Ethical start with ethics, returns and fees ethics is the gatekeeper. Unless an investment or manager meets the ethical criteria they will not be considered as part of the portfolio. Once they've met the criteria for ethics, we look at how much the return, and how much they charge in fees for their services.
- S Barry's job is to find the best ethical managers in Australia, incorporate into a mix, and deliver that to Tas Ethical's clients.
- We use specialist managers such as Australian Ethical and Future Super. They are examples of money managers where they can deliver pools of money to investors.
- S Barry prefers to use specialist companies such as above as they specialise in the space. A lot of companies now claim to be ethical managers, or have one portfolio that is reasonably well screened for climate change, but many others that are causing damage in this sense they are flogging products, not reflecting true values.
- To check managed funds against greenwashing (which is especially common in finance with money for advertising) we use several NFPs. Market forces – Melbourne based NFP that look at big managed funds and banks comparing their fund claims against actual green impact – Tas Ethical uses this regularly
- Australian centre for corporate responsibility NFP based out of Canberra. Utilise legal process at company AGMs, by drafting resolutions with lawyers and ask shareholders to vote at meetings, primarily around climate change – and then publish

- which managers/stakeholders have voted against/for these resolutions, and publically compare these voting figures.
- Ethical advisors co-op, founded by S Barry 10 years ago on this website there is a link to leaf ratings dot org, where we source 30-50 ethically specialised organisers managed funds get voted on by them on their investments as specialists like dentists voting on best toothbrush!
- Ethos goes through all portfolios and ranks against SDGs and ethical issues and gives scores comparative to a mainstream investment. Will talk through what our score is for our portfolio below.
- Takes all of the above into account when building our portfolio want it to be the best available in Australia.
- In terms of performance myth of investing ethically with climate change and societal screens is that you pay more for less performance hasn't been true for over a decade.
- Responsible Investment Association of Australia Third party report published annually for 13 years, demonstrates every year its better to do it ethically and responsibly – ethical outperformed all data points in Australia, and internationally, at 1, 3 and 5 and 10 years.
- This financial year has been one of the best in the space since Stuart started in the space 16 years ago
- Mainstream funds are about 7% below ethical investment funds, largest gap S Barry has seen – perhaps hangover from Ukraine war where countries now investing ethically for need of energy security (as opposed to ethics of climate change)
- Our portfolio has 7 investments managed across different managers –2 in property not really ethically focused. N products investing in properties in Australia othat are best from a society fund one is a charter hall fund primarily in childcare centres (socially responsible, not ethically), other is Australian Unity 180 year old NFP socially minded property manager but still not much better than other property funds.
- Remaining 5 are ethical mangers Australian ethical (pioneer, started 30 years ago by a group of permaculturalists), 2 of the other funds are in effect future super (Beta shares, one called Fair, other called Ethi) publically available funds, developed by future super for future supers members. Very deep green, very well screened, better than Australian ethical in S Barry's view.





- Also invest in international funds: Impacts managed out of London; specialised in space for over 25 years; this fund looks for global corporations that are delivering solutions to developing countries in terms of waste management, water, food security, climate change – theory is if you invest in global companies to improve developing nations system in a low resource intensity way you will also benefit financially – they provide the best return for your portfolio, 25% return.
- Stuart investors, managed out of Edinburugh over 20 years experience in the space; heavy climate change screen resource use, low consumerism screen for their portfolio; earnt over 20% this year
- Then there are also non-risk investments bank-style investments within our portfolio.
- Third party provider called Ethos mentioned above, score our portfolio comparative to mainstream numbers: climate action ours ranks 90/100 (100 = perfect), mainstream ranks 50; sustainable resource use (waste management, conflict free minerals) 94 (mainstream 52); inclusive economies (not investing in things like gaming that increase poverty, fair labor practices) 90 (mainstream50); gender equality 86 (mainstream61); health and wellbeing 90 (38); peace and justice 90 (55); life on earth (about not destroying biodiversity and humane treatment of animals) 95 (46); education access 78 (50); clean water and sanitation 93 (46). More stats available on report.
- There's almost always one dodgy stock in an otherwise good managed fund.
- In terms of funds, also ranked against Paris agreement– 1.83
 degree world mainstream portfolio aligns to a 4 degree world –
 all the super fund that don't properly screen for climate change
 (Australia worse for mining) vs international = 3 degree world.

T Hoare: In your view Stuart does our portfolio have potential for us to go further?

Any specific concerns in the portfolio?





- 1. Concerns in portfolio we have exposure to 2 of 4 big banks all finance the fossil fuel industry commonwealth and ANZ are substantially the worst (not involved); through one of the managers have been lobbying for years to remove it
- 2. Lithium most managers will invest in but still controversial because of labour practices and corruption in this industry.
- 3. One of the other managers loves unilever one of the largest single use producer for consumption in the world they have strong view that it is one of the most progressive of these companies in the world every portfolio has problematic things and it could be improved, but the best you can get.
- 4. Examples to demonstrate nothing is perfect
- 5. When we choose managers they have to be 100% transparent within their portfolio, and we need to see their voting history.

A Lamont: raised that we are still having societies bank with Commonwealth Bank. S Barry provides some advice about the specifics of entering partnership with different banks. Important to raise ethical concerns directly with Commbank to promote change.

A Lamont – who are ethical banks?

Bank of Australia is a.standout (no branch in Hobart); Hobart default is Bendigo. Bank of Queensland/Bendigo okay with no fossil fuel exposures.
