Acknowledgement of Country

We acknowledge the many nations of Tasmanian Aboriginal People across Lutruwita/Trouwerner (Tasmania), whose stories date back to time immemorial. Each had their own language, lore, lifestyle, and deep spiritual connection to land, sea and sky. From Kanamaluka (Tamar River) to Tebrakunna (Cape Portland), from Takanya (the Tarkine) to Lunawuni/Lunawanna Alonnah (Bruny Island), from Truwana (Cape Barren Island), to Flinders Island on Tayaritja/Bass Strait Islands - this always was and always will be Aboriginal land. We recognise the Palawa People as the Traditional Owners and Custodians of Lutruwita/Trouwerner.

We also acknowledge the Gadigal People of the Eora Nation, the Traditional Owners of the land on which our Rozelle campus in New South Wales stands.

We honour the enduring cultural practices of First Nations peoples, which continue today with strength, pride, and resistance. We recognise that colonisation brought profound and ongoing harm, including dispossession, violence, and the suppression of cultures, languages and identities. The University sector, including student organisations like ours, has been complicit.

The Tasmanian University Student Association now commits to truth-telling, listening, and action. We acknowledge that Tasmanian Aboriginal People have always been here, with vibrant identities, thriving cultures, and unbroken connections to Country. We pay our deepest respects to Elders past and present and to emerging leaders who carry forward stories, connections, languages, and renewal.

A message from the 2025 TUSA President

“Be kind with people, be bold against systems.”

This phrase has been my mantra through 2025, a year shaped by connection, curiosity, and a shared commitment that students deserve to be at the centre of every decision that affects them. This time last year, I mentioned to Shauna-Lee that less than 10% of organisations around the world actionise their values. 2025 has felt deeply values driven at TUSA, measuring our own values alignment down to the cent. Being kind with those around us, but challenging broken and unfair processes, both internally and externally.

So, to reflect.

One of the most significant shifts in 2025 has been the University’s renewed commitment to Students as Partners. What began as a conversation, in which the State Council called out poor “consultation” is now embedded as a cultural framework, with students involved in university governance from the ground level to university-wide decisions. Both the State Council and TUSA Management have worked hard to demonstrate capacity, maturity and develop trust, and a more robust relationship with the University, such that we can hold them to account and call out bullshit, without damaging our organisational strength. It means parts of the University have begun treating us as valued experts and equals – a key step to the cultural elimination of the “consumers” or “beneficiaries” mentality towards students.

TUSA’s advocacy has helped deliver many other broad improvements across the University. Some include extended library hours, upgrades to security at Cradle Coast and lighting and accessibility in Sandy Bay, improved supports and systems for our HDR students, and progress on after-hours access issues. Importantly, students in both the North and South now benefit from free Metro Bus access, improving flow between dispersed campuses. Adjustments to the UTAS Financial Hardship Scheme, including reduced red tape and expanded eligibility for online and distance students have helped make supports more accessible and responsive, for those of us disproportionately affected by the current economic climate. And our campaign against gender-based violence has strengthened student voices within the University’s internal reform processes.

Our internal reforms within TUSA have also been considerable. This year we secured the largest increase in SSAF funding in more than a decade, ensuring a stable and sustainable financial base for TUSA going forward. This funding increase, combined with a Board of Management that now has a student majority, means that more decisions about student money are being made directly by students. It means that TUSA is accountable to students, and can sustainably serve students well for years to come. Our flagship Food Hub program grew from one location to five, opening new hubs in Rozelle, Cradle Coast, Inveresk and Hobart City. These hubs have already served more than 15,000 students facing cost-of-living pressure. The drafting and approval of TUSA’s first Reconciliation Action Plan has also been a major milestone. This work, led by Mark Warrington and the RAP Working Group, reflects our commitment to truth-telling, cultural respect, and relationship with Riawunna and palawa community. This is an ongoing responsibility we must keep holding with care.

Finally, a big thank you to the State Council, the Equity Committee, our staff, and our students. Your effort, care, and commitment to increasing connection have shaped TUSA’s future. I’m deeply grateful to all the peers and allies who have supported my growth throughout the year, in our transition to a significant new chapter in TUSA’s 127 year history.

Chair's Statement

It is with great pleasure, in my final report as the Independent Chair of the Tasmanian University Student Association (TUSA), that I reflect on the significant transformation of our organisation over the past three years. As we look toward 2026 and beyond, TUSA stands as an organisation with a proven record of organisational transformation, nationally acknowledged and award winning services and a clear and confident pathway to its ongoing sustainability.

Based on our work over the past three years, TUSA can now confidently focus its investments in the future success of students and student leaders with a renewed sense of confidence and ambition, underpinned by this outstanding record of achievement. This strong foundation has been built on a number of key strategic pillars including:

- Our move to a student-centred and student-led governance model;
- The re-development of the "Students as Partners" framework with UTAS;
- Renewed national engagement through our reaffiliation with the National Union of Students and participation in the SEN Network;
- Improved financial sustainability; and
- Alignment with national governance standards through the Australian Institute of Company Directors Not-for-Profit principles.

To progress this ambitious agenda in 2025, we finalised several major structural reforms that will safeguard TUSA's future, including:

- A revised Constitution ensures full compliance with federal legislation while cementing TUSA's status as a genuinely student-led organisation;
- TUSA was officially renamed Tasmanian University Student Association Inc. in October 2025, reinforcing clarity in identity and governance;
- Alongside this, the new Board Charter now clearly articulates the roles, responsibilities, and ethical principles expected of the TUSA Board, providing a professional and enduring governance framework in accordance with nationally recognised standards; and
- After a three year program of financial restructuring, TUSA has now achieved a financial surplus for the first time in many years, based on a 40% Student Services and Amenities Fees allocation. This is a landmark achievement that offsets previous deficits created during years in which TUSA invested heavily in essential student programs and services despite real-term funding cuts.

None of these achievements would have been possible without the dedication of our people. I acknowledge our Student Leaders, including President Jack Oates Pryor, General Secretary Belle Smith, and the Student Council, whose leadership, engagement, and willingness to confront critical issues have been inspiring. I also extend my sincere thanks to the Management and Staff of TUSA, who have been inspirationally led by the incredible Shauna-Lee Ward and have delivered high-quality services and major governance reforms throughout a demanding year. I am grateful to the TUSA Board for their time, commitment, and enthusiasm in guiding this period of transformation. In particular, I would like to recognise Committee Chairs Rachel Baird (Governance and Nominations) and Alison Greenwood (Finance Risk and Audit) for helping guide TUSA to its current sustainable position. Finally, I thank Chloe Harris for her professional support to the Board and its committees over the past year.

I would also like to acknowledge our ongoing commitment to the deepening of our important partnership with the University. A relationship that has been progressively built on our common intent to inform the future direction of the University through student informed and led initiatives.

My thanks to Alison Watkins who has proactively worked with myself and TUSA to enable the achievement of our key governance and sustainability outcomes over my three years in the role. My thanks also to Rufus Black who has maintained a progressive and active engagement with TUSA and its leadership. I would also like to say thank you to Sally Paynter for her governance advice and stewardship along with all of the UTAS staff members we have partnered with this year.

As I reflect on the past three years, there is much to celebrate. My parting ambition is that TUSA and the University of Tasmania continue to deepen their partnership in supporting students to achieve their ambitions in life. I encourage the incoming Chair and the University to view TUSA as an increasingly significant, professional, agile, and cost-effective partner and provider of student-led services and experiences into the future.

General Manager's Statement

For the first time in more than a decade, TUSA has moved confidently out of survival mode and into a position of genuine stability, ambition, and long-term planning. This shift has been driven by the federally legislated 40% SSAF minimum allocation to student-led organisations, which came into effect in January 2025 and has fundamentally reshaped the future of student representation and student-led services at UTAS.

For more than five years, TUSA self-funded significant portions of student programs and services to maintain an acceptable standard of support. This placed sustained pressure on our financial reserves, risking depletion within five years, requiring constant trade-offs, rationing, and risk mitigation. TUSA now operates with the certainty, sustainability, and strategic freedom required to deliver the services students need, and deserve, without compromise. It is no exaggeration to say that this legislative reform has been transformational for TUSA and the broader student experience at UTAS.

A Year of Scale, Reach, and Stability

The stability provided by a 40% SSAF allocation in 2025 enabled an expansion of core student support programs. Our Student Advocacy Service reported a 19% increase in cases and 37% increase in interactions as compared to 2024, ensuring students received timely, professional, and high impact assistance during complex academic and welfare challenges.

Our Student Legal Service saw a 34% expansion of cases, and continued to expand its migration law clinics, community education, and outreach. Notably, the Pathway to Permanent Residency sessions were recognised nationally with a SEN Award of Distinction, underscoring the importance of this service to international students.

Food security initiatives continued to scale rapidly. Across our multi-campus Food Hub network, in 2025 TUSA redistributed 40.5 tonnes of rescued food, providing 7,782 students with reliable access to healthy, dignified food support. The continued expansion of community lunches, nutrition programs and local partnerships reflects our commitment to meeting not only immediate need, but the broader wellbeing of students. Our Eat It All event was the winner of the SEN Award for Best Event in Australia & New Zealand, a testament to the quality and impact of TUSA initiatives.

Meanwhile, demand for student life and connection skyrocketed. We opened our Rozelle TUSA office, providing long overdue support to our Sydney student community. Clubs & Societies delivered more than 2,600 events, generating over 100,700 student engagements and receiving over \$114,000 in grants to deliver high quality student-led initiatives. TUSA-led events increased by 85%, with community members saying, 'TUSA are everywhere at the moment', while participation in the Unique Tassie Experiences program grew by 52%. These numbers reflect a campus culture that is not only reemerging, but thriving, layered with an innovative online activation program to support our off-campus students.

From Uncertainty to Confidence

As highlighted by the Chair, TUSA's financial surplus in 2025, our first in many years, represents a turning point. TUSA has done the hard work over the last few years, digging deep to deliver operational efficiencies within a small budget envelope. The 2025 surplus was not achieved by further reductions but through the long-overdue alignment of funding with the scale of TUSA's role.

The 40% SSAF guarantee has:

- Restored organisational stability after years of real-term funding decline
- Offset longstanding financial deficits without reducing services
- Enabled sustainable staffing capacity across student support, events, operations, and governance
- Funded genuine program expansion
- Provided certainty for multi-year planning, innovation, and partnerships

For the first time in over a decade, TUSA can confidently plan beyond the current year. With stable resourcing, the organisation is now positioned to continue strengthening its services, amplify student voice, and deliver new initiatives that directly enhance the student experience.

A Team That Made It Possible

TUSA's achievements in 2025 were made possible by the commitment and skill of our staff, student leaders, volunteers, and partners. I want to acknowledge our dedicated TUSA team, whose expertise and passion drive the quality and impact of our work.

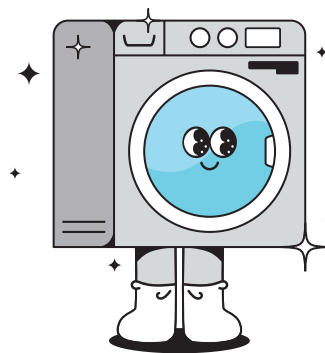

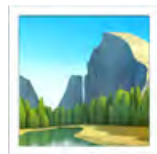

TUSA Annual General Meeting

TUSA State Council Annual Elections

The 2025 State Council Elections were commissioned on 22 August and concluded on 26 September. 2025 saw 19 candidates nominate for the Elections

Voting was conducted online via the BigPulse secure platform from 22 to 25 September 2025. A total of 1,270 votes were cast, representing 4.5% of the eligible student electorate. This marks a 13% decrease from 2024 (1,459 votes), however despite the decline, turnout remains higher than pre-COVID norms. The decline is partially attributed to five uncontested positions - President, Education President (Undergraduate), Education President (Postgraduate), Southern Campus President, and Cradle Coast Campus President. Campus activations during voting week helped maintain engagement.

TUSA Constitution Change

The Tasmanian University Student Association (TUSA) undertook a major review of its Constitution in response to significant legislative changes introduced through the Universities Accord (Student Support and Other Measures) Act 2024 and ongoing obligations under the Tasmanian Associations Incorporation Act 1964. A Constitutional Review Working Group conducted a holistic assessment to ensure compliance with new legal definitions of student-led organisations, modernise governance structures, relocate election procedures to policy, and engage in appropriate consultation with the University of Tasmania. This process included legal analysis by Sparke Helmore Lawyers and formal University feedback in April 2025, which supported most reforms but requested further consultation on proposed changes to Association membership.

Following this, the TUSA Board adopted a two-phase reform process, progressing Board composition changes and structural updates to the June 2025 AGM while deferring membership considerations. On 6 June 2025, the TUSA Board and State Council approved a revised Constitution, confirming compliance with new legislative requirements. Key reforms include expanded governance objectives, increased student representation on the TUSA Board, transfer of the authority to appoint the TUSA Chair from the University to the Board, updated conflict-of-interest and board duties provisions, formal recognition of circular resolutions, relocation of election content to policy, and updated definitions to reflect contemporary governance standards.

Australian Charities and Not for Profit Commission (ACNC)

TUSA is registered as a not-for-profit organisation with the ACNC. TUSA is required to report to the ACNC annually, which provides another layer of external accountability for TUSA's operations.

TUSA Funding Agreement

The bulk of TUSA's funding is Student Services & Amenities Fees (SSAF) which are allocated to TUSA through an annual Funding Agreement with the University of Tasmania. This agreement outlines the governance and reporting requirements attached to the funding and TUSA's operations. TUSA complied with all requirements of the Funding Agreement in 2025.

TUSA and UTAS Affiliation Agreement

TUSA's Affiliation Agreement with the University of Tasmania articulates the strategic objectives of both parties, with a shared purpose for every student to have an exceptional, safe, integrated curricular and co-curricular experience during their time at university. The Agreement outlines key accountabilities of both organisations whilst formalising support for TUSA to undertake operations.

The new 3-year 2025 TUSA-UTAS Affiliation Agreement was executed on 14th January 2025.

External Affiliations

TUSA continued to be affiliated with the National Union of Students (NUS). This peak student group played an important role lobbying and advocating for student interests during 2025.

TUSA affiliated with the Council of Australian Postgraduate Associations (CAPA) in 2025, the peak representative body for Australian postgraduate students.

2025 TUSA Financial Update

Your SSAF at TUSA

The University of Tasmania charges an annual Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) in accordance with the [Higher Education Legislation Amendment \(Student Services and Amenities\) Act 2011](#). This fee is collected by UTAS to fund student services and amenities of a non-academic nature, and is distributed between a range of service areas and provides at the University, including TUSA.

UTAS received a total of \$5,810,930 in SSAF fees, allocating \$2,324,372 to TUSA, representing 40% of the total SSAF income as legislatively required. This funding was received in four instalments.

All SSAF funds were spent within the Allowable Items permitted by the SSAF legislation for the following Programs and Services:

- TUSA Student Legal Service
- TUSA Hygiene and Food Relief
- Unique Tassie Experiences Program
- TUSA Clubs & Societies Events, Grants, Admin & Support
- Orientation and Welcome Program

- TUSA/UTAS Shared Events
- TUSA Clubs and Societies Learning and Development Program
- TUSA State Council
- Student Led Communications and Engagement, including Togatus
- TUSA Business Operations

Additionally, TUSA implemented the following new initiatives:

- TUSA Campus Activation Program
- TUSA Online Activation Program
- TUSA Rozelle Campus Program
- TUSA Financial Literacy Program (for implementation in 2026).

TUSA Investments

TUSA continued to engage TasEthical Investments as investment advisors to assist with the management of our investments in accordance with approved TUSA Financial Investment Strategy. TUSA continues to invest in a series of term-deposits in 2025 in a defensive market strategy. TUSA will be undertaking an Investment Advisor Procurement Process in Q2 2026, and will review the TUSA Investment Policy and Procedure and Financial Sustainability Strategy as part of that process.

2025 Financial Position

In 2025 TUSA ran at an operating surplus of \$514,735, primarily arising from \$362,297 in investment income, and an uplift in external grant funding to support the TUSA Food Security Program. This is a significant turnaround from previous years of significant deficit arising from insufficient SSAF allocation to deliver core programs and services. This surplus positions TUSA for improved financial sustainability following three consecutive deficit years.

Note 1

Significant Accounting Policies

The Tasmanian University Student Association Inc (TUSA) is a Not-for-Profit Association incorporated in Australia since 1899, and is the student representative body for tertiary students attending the University of Tasmania. From July 2025 TUSA is no longer considered a consolidated entity (subsidiary) of the University of Tasmania.

On the 1 April 2008 the two student service providers representing students enrolled at the University of Tasmania – the Tasmania University Union and the Student Association (SA) amalgamated under the *Associations and Incorporation Act 1964* Section 25(2). The merged entity continued with the name of Tasmania University Union. A new Constitution was adopted for the amalgamated organisation with the provision for two voting members, being the Chancellor of the University of Tasmania and the President of the Tasmania University Union. In October 2025, the Tasmania University Union officially became Tasmanian University Student Association Inc.

The registered address of TUSA is located at 2 Churchill Avenue, Sandy Bay, Tasmania.

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial report are set out below.

a) Basis of Preparation

The Board of Management have prepared the financial statements on the basis that TUSA is classified as a reporting entity from 2023. The financial report is therefore a general purpose financial report that has been prepared for distribution to members and for the purpose of fulfilling the requirements of the *Associations and Incorporation Act 1964*, the *Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012* and the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB).

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board.

The financial report is presented in Australian dollars, which is TUSA's functional currency.

The financial report has been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting using the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are carried at fair value.

The association has adopted AASB 1060 from 1 January 2023. The standard provides a new Tier 2 reporting framework with simplified disclosures that are based on the requirements of International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) for SMEs.

Use of estimates and judgements

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised and in any future periods affected. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed below:

1 Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

b) Revenue

Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) Funding – The University of Tasmania provides funding to TUSA through a Student Services and Amenities Fee Allocation Agreement. This funding is negotiated on an annual basis, and the income is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income in accordance with AASB 1058 Income of Not-for-Profit Entities and there are no specific performance obligations to be satisfied.

Goods sold – Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income at the time TUSA meets its performance obligations. The majority of sales are on a cash basis.

Interest income – Interest revenue is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income as it accrues taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Dividend / Trust income – Dividends and Trust Distributions are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

c) Taxation

Income tax

The TUSA entity does not provide for Australian income tax as it is exempt from income tax in accordance with the provisions of Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

Fringe benefits tax

TUSA is liable to pay fringe benefits tax, which is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income where applicable.

Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of Goods and Services Tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO). In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated with the amount of GST included. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included as a current asset or liability in the Statement of Financial Position.

Cash flows are included in the Statement of Cash Flow on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are classified as operating cash flows.

d) Impairment

Financial assets

A financial asset is recognised at cost and is considered to be impaired if objective evidence indicates that one or more events have had a negative effect on the estimated future cash flows of that asset.

All impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

1 Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Non-financial assets

The carrying amounts of TUSA's non-financial assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

Assets that are subject to depreciation are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

e) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash at bank and cash on hand are carried at the face value of the amount deposited. The carrying amount of cash at bank and cash on hand approximates net fair value. Interest income is recognised as it accrues, using the effective interest method.

f) Receivables

Trade debtors are generally settled within 30 days and are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any expected credit losses. The collectability of debts is assessed at year end and a specific provision is made for any expected credit losses. The carrying amount of trade debtors approximates net fair value.

g) Property, Plant & Equipment

Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant & equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditures that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. Items of property, plant & equipment costing greater than \$300 are initially recorded at cost and depreciated as outlined below.

Plant and equipment under the control of related clubs and societies have not been brought to account as TUSA does not exercise practical control over these items.

Depreciation

Depreciation is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment. Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reassessed at the reporting date. The depreciation rates for each asset class are as follows:

- Plant & equipment (10% - 50%)
- Leasehold improvements (5.3%)

h) Investments

Investments are initially recognised at cost, and subsequently carried at fair value (market value) where changes in fair value, or unrealised gains/losses are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income. Funds are invested in cash term deposits, Australian equities, overseas equities, fixed interest securities and property trusts under an approved investment policy. In 2024 and 2025, all investments are fixed interest term deposits.

1 Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

i) Payables

Liabilities are recognised in the Statement of Financial Position when it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will result from the settlement of a present obligation and the amount at which the settlement will take place can be measured reliably. Trade accounts payable are normally settled in thirty days.

j) Employee benefits

Wages and Salaries

Liabilities for wages and salaries are recognised as payables in respect of employees' service up to the reporting date.

Annual leave

The provision for employee entitlements to annual leave represents the amount that the organisation has an obligation to pay resulting from employees' service provided up to balance date. The provision has been calculated at undiscounted amounts based on wage and salary rates that TUSA expects to pay as at reporting date, including related on-costs.

Long service leave

The liability for long service leave for all employees is measured as the present value of the estimated future payments to be made in respect of services provided up to the reporting date. Consideration is given to future increases in salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Related on-costs are included in the provision. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields on government bonds at the reporting date. Those liabilities expected to be realised within 12 months are measured as the amount expected to be paid. Other employee entitlements are measured as the present value of the benefit at 31 December, where the impact of discounting is material, and at the amount expected to be paid if discounting is not material.

Superannuation

Employer contributions to satisfy SGC legislation are made to complying superannuation funds on an accumulation basis for the benefit of employees, and are recorded as an expense in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

k) Leased assets and payments

TUSA is dependent on the University of Tasmania to provide a lease for office space, meetings rooms and student study and amenities spaces on the Sandy Bay and Newnham campuses, that has significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable TUSA to further its objectives.

There are no significant restrictions on the use of the underlying asset specific to TUSA.

l) New and amended accounting standards adopted by TUSA

TUSA has adopted all the amendments to Australian Accounting Standards issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board, which are relevant to and effective for TUSA's financial statements for the annual period beginning 1 January 2025.

21 Economic Dependency

The University of Tasmania provides funding to TUSA through a Student Services Administration Fee Funding Agreement. This funding Agreement details TUSA service commitments for the term of the agreement, and is negotiated on an annual or bi-annual basis.

A Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) was introduced by the University of Tasmania in Semester 2, 2012 in accordance with the Higher Education Legislation Amendment (Student Services and Amenities) Act 2011. On an annual basis the University determines the allocation of the SSAF funds received from students, via a consultation process involving TUSA. All of TUSA's funding from the University is provided by SSAF.
